REGIONS4 AT COP28 AT A GLANCE

More than ever the Local Governments and Municipal Authorities' delegation (LGMA), and Regions4, were heard and visible, with a delegation of 20 regional governments, to advocate for the recognition of their role in accelerating action on climate change.

On the 1st and 2nd of December was convened the first-ever <u>Local Climate Action Summit (LCAS)</u>, gathering over 450 attendees from 60+ countries, including over 250 mayors and governors and allowing for more visibility and a joint call for collaboration between governments and Subnational governments to accelerate action.

The Local Governments and Municipal Authorities (LGMA) Constituency, as a unified voice of subnational governments in the UNFCCC process welcomed specific references to multi-level action by the majority of Parties in their submissions to the Global Stocktake Considerations of Outcomes, and the Coalition for High Ambition Multi-level Partnerships (CHAMP) was launched as an exemplary effort to engage local and other subnational governments in raising the ambition of their Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) by 2025.

The CHAMP initiative was endorsed by 70+ governments in order to enhance cooperation with subnational governments in the planning, financing, implementation, and monitoring of climate strategies.

The first days of COP were also successful in establishing and pledging funds for the Loss and Damage Fund that was launched in COP27 looking at direct funding and access for subnational governments.

The COP has also has shown progress regarding the integration of the twin climate and biodiversity loss crises, with a <u>COP Joint Statement On Climate</u>, <u>Nature And People</u> and the launch of relevant initiatives to support action such as channeling more than 2.5 billion USD for ecosystem-based solutions and protection of mangroves initiative (mangroves breakthrough targets).

Regions4 was able to contribute directly to the negotiations around the <u>Global Stocktake (GST)</u> and the <u>Glasgow-Sharm el-Sheikh work programme on the global goal on adaptation (GGA)</u>, reflecting its valuable role in taking stock of the progress of regional governments on adaptation through the <u>RegionsAdapt initiative</u> and its <u>RegionsAdapt 2023 Progress Report</u>, and influencing the climate processes.

As a result, significant references to multilevel action in the GST and GGA outcomes, 70+ nations signing the COP28 Coalition for High Ambition Multilevel Partnership (CHAMP) for Climate Action, strong support for multilevel cooperation at the <u>Ministerial Meeting on Urbanization and Climate Change</u>, and unprecedented inclusion by the COP28 Presidency in the official COP agenda including the first-ever Local Climate Action Summit, all herald a new phase of collaboration between all levels of government.

AN EXCEPTIONAL COP FOR SUBNATIONAL GOVERNMENTS

A Growing Voice and Recognition of States, Local and Regional Governments Within UNFCCC Process

From 30 November to 12 December, the United Arab Emirates (UAE) hosted the 28th Conference of the Parties (COP) to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) in Dubai, gathering nearly 200 countries and over 97,000 participants, being the biggest COP to date.

The Conference of the Parties are one of the most important moments for global climate action, and this year the two-week thematic programme of the COP28 Presidency focused on responding to the <u>Global Stocktake (GST)</u>, the review of progress on mitigation commitments, and the <u>Glasgow-Sharm el-Sheikh work programme on the Global Goal on Adaptation (GGA)</u>, closing the gaps so that we can achieve the goals of the 2030 Agenda.

For the first time, the COP28 Presidency held an open consultation on the <u>thematic</u> <u>areas</u>, inviting contributions from a wide range of stakeholders, including governments, businesses, civil society, youth and indigenous peoples.

Each day of the COP28 programme was dedicated to specific themes to support global action on climate change, including gender, youth, energy, agriculture and others, as well as four cross-cutting themes: Technology and Innovation, Inclusion, Frontline Communities and Finance.



LGMA COP28 PRESS CONFERENCE

A Turning Point for Cities and Regions in Climate Action Leadership



On 30th November, at a press conference in Dubai to preview the position of cities and regions at COP28, leaders including the Deputy Secretary of International Relations for the City of São Paulo, Maria Auxiliadora Figueiredo, shared how this year's COP emphasized the importance of subnational involvement, including by the LGMA advocacy, the Local Climate Action Summit, and the Multilevel Action & Urbanization Pavilion.

The Local Governments and Municipal Authorities (LGMA) Constituency, which voices subnational governments in the UNFCCC process, presented its COP28 position paper with more than 71 endorsing entities. The paper calls for an integrated approach involving cities, regions, and local governments to limit global warming and enhance adaptation measures. The endorsers stress the urgency of translating Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and National Adaptation Plans (NAPs) into tangible local strategies, advocating for a robust multilevel governance model to facilitate this transition.

The LGMA Position Paper, co-drafted between Regions4, Under2 Coalition and the Committee of European Regions (COR) outlines a unified stance for the summit and was endorsed by 71 partner organizations and entities. Shared broadly with national parties and other negotiators in the run-up to COP28, the messages found in the paper are also reflected in the EU Council's pre-cop position, the G7 and G20 outcomes, UN-Habitat Assembly resolution and others.

THE COP28 LOCAL CLIMATE ACTION SUMMIT

A Milestone Event for Local and Regional Climate Leadership



The Local Climate Action Summit (LCAS), hosted by the COP28 Presidency and Bloomberg Philanthropies on 1-2 December 2023, is a first-of-its-kind event recognizing the vital role of local leaders in reducing emissions, addressing climate risks, and energizing national climate efforts. The summit gathered together hundreds of climate leaders to transform climate finance, enhance global action, accelerate energy transitions, and strengthen local resilience.

Support from leading networks and organizations, including the C40 Cities Climate Leadership Group, Global Covenant of Mayors for Climate & Energy, ICLEI UCLG, US Conference of Mayors, Under2 Coalition, and UN-Habitat, underscores this event's collaborative and global nature, aiming to accelerate progress and amplify impact both locally and globally.

Launch of the <u>COP28 Coalition for High Ambition Multilevel Partnerships (CHAMP)</u>: Elevating Collaboration for Ambitious Contributions. CHAMP's launch during COP28 marked a significant milestone, providing a robust platform for local and regional leaders to contribute to ambitious Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) actively. The endorsement by 70+ national governments reflects a global acknowledgement of the imperative to foster collaboration between national and subnational levels. This initiative exemplifies the growing recognition that addressing climate change requires a collective and multilevel approach.

We share below the key messages from Regions4 President around the LCAS:



Regional governments from across the globe are at the forefront of the climate emergency, experiencing direct impacts on their communities, economies, institutions and critical infrastructure and resources. They are showing bold leadership for the necessary transformations towards resilient economies and territories, from coastal protection to sustainable water management, from nature-based solutions to community engagement. However, as the Global Stocktake and UNEP Adaptation Gap report reveal, a significant shortfall exists in financing adaptation, leaving an estimated annual gap of US\$194-366 billion per year. To drive change locally, climate finance should pivot to support subnational levels, empowering regional authorities to have direct participation and a voice of their own, thereby accelerating climate action.

KEY OUTCOMES OF NEGOTIATIONS RELEVANT TO REGIONAL GOVERNMENTS

We have been working to influence the outcome text of the COP28 negotiations so that it refers to subnational governments and multilevel governance. Consult the proposed text here as part of the LGMA COP28 position.

In particular, we have been working to influence the outcome text of the Global Stocktake (GST), and the Glasgow Sharm-el-Sheikh work program on the Global Goal on Adaptation (GGA).

Main decisions: after very difficult days of negotiations, COP28 resulted in countries delivering a <u>package of decisions</u>.

The Global Stocktake (GST)

LGMA and Regions4 have been actively engaging with the Global Stocktake process since its commencement and supported the strong pressure for fossil fuel phase-out that dominated the negotiations. While the inclusion of a transition away from fossil fuels is a landmark step, it fails to recognize the climate emergency state that we are in.

LGMA and Regions4 welcome that some of its contributions have been reflected in the final text of the <u>GST decision text</u>. We applaud the move away from just recognizing the role that multilevel action can play in delivering climate action but also actively seeks to apply principles of the CHAMP initiative in the text, such as in paragraph 161 that "Urges Parties and non-Party stakeholders to join efforts to accelerate delivery through inclusive, multilevel, gender-responsive and cooperative action".

The Global Goal on Adaptation (GGA) and finance for adaptation

Regions4 and the European Committee of the Regions (COR) co-led the working group on adaptation for the LGMA and have worked towards the inclusion of subnationals within the GGA throughout the year leading up to COP28, including via submissions to the Global Stocktake Technical Dialogues. The working group also inputted to four Glasgow Sharm El Sheikh workshops.

Heloise Chicou, Climate Action and Resilience Program Manager at Regions4 said, "Up to ninety percent of the action on adaptation happens at the local and subnational level and this needs to be reflected in global goal on adaptation to allow for accelerated implementation for people and nature."



Leading the front with the Committee of European Regions (COR) in terms of influencing the negotiations for subnationals on adaptation, Regions4 influenced the outcomes of the decision text on the GGA as reflected in 5 paragraphs (Preamble, 9, 14,20,22) such as the recognition of adaptation as a global challenge "faced by all with local, subnational, national, regional and international dimensions", and the vital role of all stakeholders, including local governments. We have called for increased ambition and support to facilitate swift action at all levels, from local to global, and the importance of guiding adaptation efforts using local knowledge systems, ecosystem-based approaches, nature-based solutions, and locally led and community-based strategies.

However, the outcome text falls short in addressing the specific financial needs required to empower local and subnational governments who are facing the impacts firsthand, along with coordinated mechanisms with national governments. Additionally, extending the timeframe through the inclusion of the language "2030, and progressively beyond" fails to recognize the climate emergency state that we are in.

Moreover, the draft needed more precise language to delineate clear implementation means, especially concerning the adaptation finance gap and concrete targets. The unresolved inclusion of the common but differentiated responsibilities and respective capabilities (CBDR-RC) principle remained a critical point of contention.

Leaders at COP28 acknowledged a significant funding gap for nationwide climate change adaptations, with estimates ranging from US\$194 billion to US\$366 billion annually, according to the <u>UNEP Adaptation Gap Report.</u> This acknowledgment is underscored by recent evidence indicating a troubling 15% decrease in adaptation funding in 2021, totaling US\$24.6 billion.

Empowering Local Resilience through Loss and Damage Operationalization

The operationalization of the <u>Loss and Damage (L&D) Fund</u> on day one marked a historic moment, celebrating commitments from the UAE, USA, Japan, and the EU. With a commitment to direct access for subnational governments, this fund represents a tangible step toward addressing climate change's real and immediate impacts at the local level.

The agreement outlines conditions for the operationalization of the Loss and Damage Fund, specifying that the World Bank must host the Fund in a manner that enables direct access to resources by all developing countries. This access includes subnational, national, and regional entities, as well as small grants funding for communities, in accordance with policies and procedures established by the Fund's Board and relevant safeguards.

The fund is directed to actively engage with national, subnational, and local levels to enhance efficiency and achieve tangible outcomes. The Board is tasked with developing modalities for resource access, including direct access through subnational, national, and regional entities, either independently or in collaboration with accredited entities from other funds such as the GCF, GEF, and the Adaptation Fund.



Nature-based solutions, climate change and biodiversity protection

The COP showed progress regarding the integration of the twin crisis between climate change and biodiversity loss with a statement from the COP presidency and parties on a COP Joint Statement On Climate, Nature And People and the launch of relevant initiatives to support action such as channeling more than 2.5 billion to drive progress against the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (KMGBF), including the 30x30 nature protection target. The upsurge in nature finance not only starts a self-reinforcing cycle of adaptation and resilience but also helps to unlock the potential for nature to provide a third of the needed mitigation solutions by 2030.

KEY HIGHLIGHTS AND CONTRIBUTIONS FROM LOCAL AND REGIONAL GOVERNMENTS

Second Ministerial Meeting on Urbanization and Climate Change

On 6 December 2023, the COP28 Presidency, UN-Habitat and the UN Climate Change High Level Champions co-hosted the Second Ministerial Meeting on Urbanization and Climate Change as the high-level opening for the Multilevel Action, Urbanization, Built Environment, and Transport Day.

A joint outcome statement for both the Ministerial Meeting and LCAS was released that encourages the Parties to include multilevel cooperation in achieving the Paris Agreement and including the CHAMP initiative and local stocktakes as critical mechanisms for this goal.

Some Key Initiatives launched at COP28

Scottish Government and C40 Partnership: A Collaborative Endeavor for Climate Justice: The £1 million partnership between the Scottish Government and C40 Cities represents a collaborative endeavor to focus on loss and damage in marginalized communities. This commitment underscores the importance of targeted and inclusive initiatives to address the disproportionate impacts of climate change on vulnerable populations.

Mediterranean Climate Action Partnership (MCAP): Pioneering Bioregional Innovation: The partnership between Catalonia and California within the Mediterranean Climate Action Partnership (MCAP) stands out as an innovative approach to resilience and biodiversity action. This bioregional collaboration, involving 14 states/regions from five continents, demonstrates a shared commitment to localized climate action.

Key Publications and Reports Unveiled During CoP28

Regions 4 has listed over 20 publications that were launched at COP28, including the Multilevel Governance Atlas from WRI, the Yearbook of Global Climate Action 2023 from the Marrakech Partnership for Global Climate Action, the Race to Resilience second progress report, and the Sharm El-Sheikh first implementation report from the Climate champions.

In particular, Regions4 was involved as a partner to the task force that launched the Integrity Matters for Cities States and Regions report. This report is a follow-up to the flagship Integrity Matters report launched last year at COP27 by the High-Level Expert Group on the Net-Zero Emissions Commitments of Non-State Entities (HLEG). It outlines recommendations for subnational governments to ensure the credibility, accountability, and transparency of their climate and sustainability commitments while acknowledging their varied capacities and characteristics.

Regions4 was able to have a strong presence at COP28, thanks to a year-long solid collaboration with members and partners to develop a participatory strategy roadmap (joint preparatory webinar, delegation kit, dedicated website and newsletters, WhatsApp COP28 engagement channel) to support our collective advocacy efforts; reinforce the RegionsAdapt community and its contribution to the Race To Resilience campaign, and continue to raise regions' voice within the UNFCCC with key events and initiatives such as the #RegionsVoice campaign.

The overall objective of Regions4 participation at the COP28 was to promote multilevel governance for increasing ambition and effective action on climate action and resilience through the key role of regional governments.



REGIONSADAPT 2023 REPORT: ADDRESSING CLIMATE JUSTICE IN REGIONAL ADAPTATION PLANNING AND ACTION



RegionsAdapt is the pioneering initiative launched in 2015 at COP21 that brings together leading regions on climate change adaptation, to foster collaboration, as well as learning and raising capacities. Annually, Regions4 releases RegionsAdapt annual reports, based on CDP data and BC3 interviews, detailing progress and actions by regional governments in adapting to climate change.

With the support and contribution of the Government of Quebec, this year's report not only continues reporting to the Race to Resilience Campaign but introduces a groundbreaking thematic exploration into climate justice. It illustrates how regional governments integrate vulnerable communities and climate justice dimensions into their climate adaptation strategies and showcases more than 16 good practices from subnational governments in the matter.

The report was officially unveiled to the global audience with a livestream on Regions4 YouTube channel on 5 December 2023, from the Resilience Hub pavilion at COP28.

The session:

- Presented the second Race to Resilience Progress Report, taking stocktake on implementation.
- Showcased progress on pledges: Partners have committed to increasing the resilience of 3.19 billion people by 2030.
- Highlighted progress on the number of individuals benefited, hectares impacted, and finance mobilized by partners.
- Presented the Regions4 RegionsAdapt 2023 Progress Report.

OPPORTUNITIES AND CHALLENGES FOR SUBNATIONAL CLIMATE ACTION: EXPERIENCES AND ADVANCES FROM CHILE AND LATIN AMERICA

Date: Wednesday, 6th of December.

Description: Chile is a pioneer in defining explicit guidelines, as testified by its new Climate Change Framework Law, which promotes integrated climate action at all management levels, including national sectors, regions, municipalities and even watersheds. This, however, requires important advances in capacity building, information and governance. In this context, the panel sought to show and discuss Chile's and Latin American experiences on this matter, attending to different actors linked to this process.

Description: The UNFCCC COP28 and CBD COP15 Presidencies brought together governments and leaders across society at a ministerial roundtable to discuss the importance, challenges, and opportunities in adopting a synergetic approach in the design and implementation of national climate and biodiversity plans and strategies.

The Ministerial was chaired by Razan Al Mubarak High-Level Champion, COP28 and Manuel Pulgar-Vidal, Action Agenda Champion, Convention on Biological Diversity.

The Executive Secretaries of the UNFCCC and UN CBD, Inger Anderson, Executive Director, UNEP as well as key Ministers, civil society groups and others present stressed the importance of urgency and scale implementation is needed now.

Likewise there is no path forward that does not pass through territories. At Regions4 we see clearly how subnational governments, including cities, states, and regions, are providing compelling leadership, and real solutions integrating the climate and biodiversity agendas."





COP28 NATURE DAY RECEPTION - PRESENTATION OF THE NATURE POSITIVE INITIATIVE AND LAUNCH OF THE FORUM

Organisers: Nature Positive Initiative.

Date: Saturday 9th of December.

Description: After a successful launch of the Nature Positive Initiative in New York, a whole-of-society approach and alignment among governments, businesses, financial institutions and civil society around a common definition of 'Nature Positive' as well as actions at different scales will be necessary to deliver the Nature Positive goal. The Nature Positive Initiative is therefore launching a diverse and inclusive Forum, with the purpose of aligning and coordinating our efforts to support a nature-positive outcome, and welcomes members from a variety of sectors, including from environment NGOs, private sector coalitions and actors, development and humanitarian organizations, and many more.



Jordan Harris, Regions4 Executive Director at the Nature Positive Initiative Reception stated, "There is no pathway to limiting global warming to 1.5°C without addressing nature loss and land degradation. Rather than treat the climate and biodiversity crises separately, we need integrated solutions that tackle them simultaneously. And subnational leaders are finding real solutions, but they need to give a boost to keep that exponential transformation unfolding. Their best practices in integrated approaches, transformative governance, and financing mechanisms for climate and biodiversity action make them natural and muchneeded leaders in the field".

The session highlighted good practices on how capacity building at sub-national and local levels can be scaled up at the national level. It identified country support needs to advance capacity building for vertical integration and opportunities for technical and financial support to strengthen these efforts.

LOOKING TOWARDS THE FUTURE

Parties adopted a decision (FCCC/CP/2023/L.4) accepting Azerbaijan's offer to host COP 29 from Monday, 11 November, to Friday, 22 November 2024, and Brazil's offer to host COP 30 from Monday, 10 November, to Friday, 21 November 2025.

Looking towards the future, and as a follow up of COP28, Regions4 will:

- Follow-up on COP28 commitments and initiatives related to regions and connecting regions with opportunities, looking notably at loss and damage.
- Advocacy strategy for COP29, regular consultations, and participatory process with members for joint action and positioning.
- Ensure a strong presence at COP29: side events and RegionsAdapt report, focusing on finance, as a key priority topic for the year.
- Consolidation of partnerships: Climate-KIC, Under 2 Coalition, Resilience Hub and Lab, WRI, GIZ, EF, NAP Global Network, IUCN, IIED and other strategic partners.
- Development of partnership and project proposal with key partners such Under2Coalition: Supporting developing regions to develop adaptation plans and engage in COP29.
- Reinforce RegionsAdapt community of practice learning sessions with dedicated webinars on learning from the 2023 progress report.
- Support the implementation of the Climate Champions Agenda for Adaptation for regional governments.

• RegionsAdapt annual reporting: alignment of RegionsAdapt reporting with Race to Resilience metrics and scoring of progress.
